Annual Fund: "In Joyful Confidence"

Thanks to all of you who contributed to the HCA Annual Fund last fiscal year, concluding on June 30, 2013. The total unrestricted funds raised was approximately \$81,000. In addition, we were blessed with restricted funds donated to complete our Art and Music rooms, but it was certainly a challenge to meet our regular operational obligations. This year, we have set a goal of \$120,000 in unrestricted gifts and we ask that you consider partnering with HCA to offer an excellent, faith-based educational opportunity for the next generation. The theme is "In Joyful Confidence" and is inspired by Msgr. Matthew Luczycki's hope filled outlook.

Let me tell you something you may not have known about Fr. Matt. He understood the importance of HCA's mission and always provided encouragement. He saw the declining number of youth in the pews and the closing of so many Catholic schools and he knew that young Catholics and their families needed to have their faith supported and reinforced in the classroom. He established the Kolbe fund to provide tuition assistance for the needy and to encourage graduating seniors to attend Catholic colleges. In the very lean years, he was so generous.

Fr. Matt wanted to remain an anonymous donor while he was still living, but he was hopeful that after he passed, his example of generosity would inspire others to be generous. I can share with you now that Fr. Matt's contributions have totaled close to \$100,000. He always said he wouldn't need the money where he was going, but he did ask for prayers. In our final conversation two days before he died, his last words to me were, "Pray for me." I promised that I would. I encourage all of you to do the same for Fr. Matt, for Everett Vanderhoof and all of our deceased benefactors. Also pray for the students, families, faculty, staff, and donors that belong to this large family we call HCA.

NOTE: One thoughtful option is to make a bequest to Holy Cross and remember the Academy in your will. As an independent school, we do not rely on federal, state, or diocesan support. Very plainly, without you, there is no HCA!



On a Mission for Life

It was snowing. It was exhausting. It was cold. But we were all so glad to be there in Washington, DC, on January 24, 2013. Our 80 voices joined over 500,000 others to speak up for America's most defenseless citizens at the 40th annual March for Life. Every day throughout the year the teachers, staff and parents of Holy Cross Academy build a reverence for life in the students, but it was an encouraging and uplifting experience for all of us to see we are certainly not alone.

Walking along in the largest crowd of people most of us had ever seen, we knew we were all part of a huge and growing movement toward the improvement of our country, despite the opposing attitudes of the NY senators' staff we had encountered earlier in the day. At least 90 percent of the marchers hailed from high schools and colleges, and hearing snippets of their conversation as we marched inspired hope for the future.

The day after the march, we had the valuable educational opportunity to explore the museums and other sites in our nation's



capitol. Students saw artifacts from America's aviation history, admired some of the world's greatest works of art, and marveled at the immensity of dinosaur skeletons. HCA seniors demonstrated their responsibility and maturity by guiding their own tours in small groups and meeting at the rendezvous point right on time.

On Sunday we were welcomed warmly by the parish of St. Mary's in Fairfield, PA. The HCA choir sang a touching pro-life song called "Before You Were Born" during Mass. The obviously pro-

life parish and priest gave us their heartfelt thanks, plus coffee and donuts, and we returned the gratitude as well. An all too short stop at the Shrine of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton capped off the trip before we headed back north to Oneida.

Overall the three-day excursion further cemented the bonds of camaraderie and friendship in the HCA community through our shared mission participating in the March for Life. We are grateful to the Good News Foundation for the grant that made this treasured trip possible.

Spiritual Message - Fr. Joseph F. Kehoe

In the first semester of our first year at LeMoyne College in 1953, Fr. Cox, SJ, taught us Theology and gave us an assignment to outline the four gospels. This was an excellent introduction for all of us to love and understand our Catholic faith as we began our four years there.

On Dec. 8, 1975, the apostolic exhortation "On Evangelization in the Modern World" by Pope Paul VI was given in Rome. For a few moments let us look at this document. In Section II the question is asked, "What is evangelization?" Pope Paul VI in #17 states: "...Thus it has been possible to define evangelization in terms of proclaiming Christ to those who do not know him, of preaching, of catechesis, of conferring baptism and the other sacraments.

Any partial and fragmentary definition which attempts to render the reality of evangelization in all its richness, complexity and dynamism does so only at the risk of impoverishing it and even of distorting it. It is impossible to grasp the concept of evangelization unless one tries to keep in view all its essential elements."

In #22 of this great document, this same pope said, "...There is no true evangelization if the name, the teaching, the life, the promises, the kingdom and the mystery of Jesus of Nazareth, the Son of God, are not proclaimed."

In my adult religious education classes this year I plan to use the following:


- The Jerusalem Bible, Reader's Edition

In addition to these books, I find the *Navarre Scripture Commentary* very helpful and very spiritual.

Our Catholic faith is our most precious treasure. Our goal is to attain eternal happiness with God in Heaven in the next life. This life here on earth is very short compared to eternity. Read, study, meditate, pray and act. We must use the gifts of time, talent and treasure to the best of our ability while we are still alive.

Let us all be inspired by our new Holy Father, Pope Francis. Stay close to the Holy Family. Jesus, Mary and Joseph will help us achieve our final goal.

oing from a cramped space at one end of the cafeteria to a generously sized dedicated art room has been a godsend to HCA art teacher Lory van Lieshout and her students. "It has allowed me to have a room solely devoted to allowing the students to fully experience and experiment with art," Mrs. van Lieshout said. "Now with the art room, students are no longer distracted with the activity in the cafeteria." She also said the new room features plenty of shelves to keep art supplies close at hand and easy to find.

"I am very thankful to the donor that helped pay for the addition as well as to all the people who volunteered countless hours of their time to make it become a reality," said Mrs. van Lieshout.

The new space also provided a room for instrumental music lessons. Before the new room, lessons were held in the chapel, but this was not ideal. "Our chapel needs to be open for prayer whenever possible," said HCA music director Scott Rutledge. "Now that we have the music room, there is so much more room to store instruments and music, and I often find students practicing here after school."

He also said the windows in the new room make it a bright positive place. "These things may be taken for granted in almost every other school in the country, but not here. We know it is a blessing and not a day goes by where the room isn't witness to a lot of laughter, learning and growth."

Dreaming even bigger, Mr. Rutledge added, "I can't help but think how incredible it would be to have a performance hall here at Holy Cross Academy. It would be invaluable to be able to host our concerts and drama and theater productions in our own performance facility. There is no way to exaggerate the positive impact it would have on our students, staff and the surrounding community."

On behalf of HCA's music students, Mr. Rutledge expressed heartfelt gratitude for the monumental effort the new rooms required. "It proves there are generous people who believe in what we are doing and the work God has placed before us. To all

who made it possible, I say many thanks and please, keep us in your prayers."

The new rooms were finished and ready for use in October of 2012 after three months of intense work. The project began by removing the old foundation and excavating what was once a crawl space and pouring new concrete floors. Then HCA parent and student volunteers put their talents to use, from framing and plumbing, to communication lines and painting. Materials and heavy equipment were donated by the van Lieshout family and their business Brabant Farms. Jacking and excavation was done by Scott Moyer. A special "thanks" goes out to Steve Anderson.

Students Take On the World

HCA students do more than absorb learning at school. They put what they learn into action. They are more than future leaders. They're leaders right now!

Last February Rose Judge and Jilianne Cady together with English teacher Mary Peterson held the first meeting of Holy Cross Academy Lifesavers. More than 20 students dedicated part of their lunchtime to attend the first meeting. The group began just in time to participate in 40 Days for Life, a national campaign that combines fasting, community outreach and peaceful prayer vigils on the sidewalk in front of abortion centers. Each week during Lent, groups of 8-10 students, parents and teachers stood in front of the Planned Parenthood center on Genesee Street in Syracuse in frigid temperatures and prayed for the souls involved in the abortions taking place there. Leaders of 40 Days for Life in Syracuse were delighted to see the students' involvement and invited them to march in the Syracuse St. Patrick's Day parade with their group.

Jilianne even started a Facebook page to post about the Lifesavers' activities and other pro-life updates. It's called Holy Cross Academy Life Savers.

Facebook is a new tool of communication and is being put to good use by the innovative students of HCA. After an appalling anti-Catholic page appeared on Facebook in July, Aaron Dostie, Isabel Romero and Rose Judge started a page to combat evil with good. It's called Heroic Catholicism.
