Tenth Year of Miracles Begins!

The 2006 - 2007 academic year marks the beginning of Holy Cross Academy's tenth year. When HCA opened back in 1997, ten years seemed so far in the future. We began in a small, two room school house, with just four students, but with a vision of transforming the whole world in Christ.

One of the first "miracles" was receiving notice that we were officially established as a new educational entity on the birthday of Fr. Thomas Riley, the founder of Holy Cross Catechetical Center who had died a few years earlier, but who was an inspiration to us and to whom some of us privately prayed for his intercession.

We debated whether or not to open that year since we had raised only a little over \$10,000 - enough for two loaves and five fish, but for a new school? After many novenas, the decision was to go forward. As we knelt before the Blessed Sacrament and consecrated HCA to the Immaculate Heart of Mary on the 80th anniversary of the miracle of the sun at Fatima, we felt that we had begun a journey from which we would not turn back.

We have witnessed many miracles along the way - some may be

considered small coincidences, but other naturally unexplainable occurrences have been essential to the survival of this apostolate. (Those who know the founders and their shortcomings will agree that the fact that we are still in business must be a miracle!). We can't count the number of times the exact amount needed for payroll arrived the day checks were to be mailed. Now we consider it our bimonthly miracle.

In a way, we have come to expect miracles. We believe that if it is God's will, it will be accomplished, as long as we are willing to do His work, uniting our will and mission to His. And what is His work? Bringing the Truth in Charity to His people, the Truth that has been faithfully transmitted from age to age through the Catholic Church, "the pillar and foundation of the truth." 1 Tim. 3:15

Top 50 in America - Third Consecutive Year!



announced its third annual selection of the best 50 Catholic secondary schools in America. The Honor Roll provides a powerful resource to parents and educators by acknowledging those schools that best maintain high academic standards, uphold their Catholic identities, and prepare

Nearly 1300 Catholic high schools were invited to apply to the Honor Roll by completing surveys that measure academic excellence, Catholic identity, and civic education. Holy Cross Academy is among only 12 schools that have made the list for three consecutive years. With this high level of competition, inclusion on the Honor Roll indicates outstanding success in each of the disciplines examined.

Overall, 25 states are represented on the Honor Roll. Eleven different religious orders sponsor honorees, including the Dominicans, Legionaries of Christ, Jesuits, and Norbertines. Character Education

- "What's your Unity Group doing?"

You may hear questions or comments like these in the hallways of Holy Cross this school year as students embark on a campaign to grow in the virtues of respect and responsibility. The seed of this venture was planted last spring at a teacher workshop which featured Dr. Thomas Lickona, author, speaker and director of the Center for the 4th and 5th "R's" at SUNY Cortland. Dr. Lickona, whose field is character education, has made a study of high schools that place strong emphasis on building character in students. He and his colleague, Dr. Matthew Davidson, published a book, Smart and Good High Schools, which identifies eight strengths of character and ways to help youth lead productive, ethical, and fulfilling lives. The teacher workshop stressed particular methods applicable to Holy Cross Academy, taking into consideration the student population and its unique characteristics.

Even though Dr. Lickona's group works in both public and private high schools throughout the country and the world, his strong Catholic faith is a pillar of his ideas and methods. He sees two essential parts of character building: performance character and moral character. The outcomes he foresees in students as a result of stressing these two components are: lifelong learner and critical thinker, diligent and capable performer, socially and emotionally skilled person, ethical

thinker, respectful and responsible moral agent, selfdisciplined person, democratic citizen, and spiritual person.

Teachers and students now are in the beginning process of implementing some basic ideas through which these outcomes will be achieved. Unity groups are configurations of students from various grades who come together to form friendly relationships and boost one another's school spirit. They devise ways to be of service to the school and to help one

another do their best. Also in process is a method of enhancing the school culture by crafting a "Touchstone," a set of principles to guide daily reflection and behavior. Both teachers and students will be involved in identifying core values which inspire their attitudes and help them strive for excellence in school and in life.

Everyone involved in Holy Cross knows that we have always been a "smart and good" school. Through these efforts, and with God's help, we hope to become even smarter and ... gooder? Better!

As we plan to expand our facility, we must be sure that we can meet our daily obligations. We have been increasing tuition each year, but if tuition becomes too high, our enrollment may be affected. Maintaining the proper balance is difficult as we grow, and one day we will have a more stable income level from tuition. Fundraising event participation is variable year to year and some efforts are more productive than others. We try not to burden families and donors with endless fundraisers. The majority of our support comes from those who believe in Holy Cross Academy, those who are behind our mission of transmitting the truth in a loving, family-like setting.

This is truly a leap of faith - faith in Our Lord, faith in our mission, and faith in our generous, quiet supporters who sustain us through their prayers and donations.




Bursting at the Seams!

Building Expansion Necessary

Holy Cross Academy moved into the current facility just three years ago with 25 students. Today we have over 70 with projections for next year of at least 85 and possibly more than 90. While enrollment at many schools in the area continues to drop, we have the exact opposite "problem". This is great news! But great news often presents great challenges. Here is the situation: Our facility is bursting at the seams! There simply is no room to accommodate any more students.

Our options are to turn away new students or expand our facility. You know



We are currently looking at several options that would allow a phased approach. Our immediate need is for additional classroom space to accomodate



next year's enrollment, but this will fit into a larger plan that will include a larger library, a science lab, a gymnasium and an expanded cafeteria. The cost could realistically be a few million, but the initial phase will probably be a few hundred thousand.

We are very fortu-

nate to have so many talented individuals willing to offer their expertise in all phases of construction, from concrete and carpentry to electrical and finish

work. We believe that Our Lord has placed together all the pieces necessary for this project for His purpose. We are confident that once our plans are presented to our loyal and generous supporters, the final element (funding, of course) will fall into place and we will be able to launch HCA into the next decade of miracles. 

Spiritual Message

From Fr. Joseph Kehoe - Spiritual Advisor

When I think of Holy Cross Academy, I usually think of Fr. Thomas M. Riley. Back in the spring of 1980 a folder from Holy Cross Catechetical Center, New London, NY was sent to a number of priests in the diocese. Having first met Fr. Riley in the fall of 1976, I became very interested in the structure of his program. This priest followed the official teaching authority of the Catholic Church and he always referred to the documents which came out of Rome. He had a number of courses in his program which included: Basic Catechetics, The Church, The Bible, Mariology, and Christology. In the course on Catechetics, he referred to Pope John Paul II and his document entitled "Catechesis In Our Time". He also quoted from the General Catechetical Directory by Pope Paul VI. In a booklet he sent me in April 1981 he brought out the need for good Catholic Philosophy, Grace, Patrology, Apologetics, the Liturgy, Ascetical Theology, solid Church Music and the need for effective methods of teaching the Catholic Faith. Even though Fr. Riley died Feb. 3, 1993 at the age of 83, I believe that his goodness lives on today at Holy Cross Academy. The people involved in this Academy have a great love of God and the Catholic Church and I believe that when they pass from this life to the next they will have a great reward waiting for them in heaven.
